The month of September is the Season of Creation. The season finishes on October 4th - the feast day of St. Francis. Here in Aotearoa New Zealand. we are seeing the signs of creation and new life visually expressed in the signs of Spring - blossom, daffodils, birds reappearing as warmer weather means an abundance of food. As we celebrate the colours of spring we are equally reminded of the effects of climate change. As this is written Cyclone Florence is making impact on the Carolina coast of the U.S.A. and Typhoon Mangkhut has wreaked havoc in the Philippines. What is significant about both these storm events is the size of both - they are extremely large.

Humanity has a lot to answer for - particularly in our love affair of fossil fuels. Devastating tropical cyclones are becoming all too common whereas twenty years ago, such devastating events were less frequent.

As we celebrate spring and reflect on creation, let us remember those lifes lost from such weather events - and look at ways we can reduce our consumption of fossil fuels.

Climate Change / Global Warming: What does the future hold?

According to Christiana Figueres (former UN Climate Chief), the next three years is crucial to stopping the worst effects of global warming. Globally we have seen, in the news media, multiple stories on extreme weather, most currently Cyclone Florence and Typhoon Mangkhut. Storm surges, landslips and flooding has taken life. These patterns will continue as most of the world's population live in coastal areas. Surprisingly, while many communities are coping with more extreme weather events, the carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere have remained relatively flat.

Although emission levels have been flat, this is no time for complacency in lowering emission levels. If we can continue to make a concerted effort in continuing to lower emission levels in Carbon Dioxide, then irreversible and runaway warming can be avoided. Society need to be more proactive in moving away from fossil fuel sources of energy towards more renewable sources. Incentives need to be implemented by policy makers to encourage people to turn toward electric cars, as well as public transport systems that are also electric. Yet for this to happen an investment in infrastructure that supports electric transport must be established first, so

that the 'buy-in' for electric alternatives is taken up more quickly.

As the demand for electricity grows, renewable sources of energy generators need to also grow. New Zealand has a high proportion of hydro electric dams. To have more can be detrimental to our existing freshwater ecosystems which are already under threat. Investment to create more wind and solar generated power need to be considered, as well as tidal generated energy. An area of concern, in New Zealand, is our methane emission levels from agriculture. New Zealand has some of the highest rates of methane output in the world. Work is being done, in exploring different pasture mixes to help lower methane output. Other possibilities in capturing methane and using it as a energy source is also being studied. What does the future hold, within the agriculture industry in New Zealand? Are changes in our diet preferences both on a national and international level needing to change also? As the world's population continues to struggle with erratic weather...the answer is likely to become a definitive yes.
